Dear Mr. Parnes:

At your request and that of attorney David Nevin, I interviewed the above Mr. Richard Leavitt at the Maximum Security Prison in Boise, Idaho for a period of 4.5 hours on 3/13/06.

Focus of Evaluation

I paid particular attention in my evaluation of Mr. Leavitt to:

- an assessment of his personality;
- any indications that Mr. Leavitt may suffer from any diagnosable mental or emotional condition;
- any indications as to whether, and, if so, to what extent, Mr. Leavitt's mental and or emotional condition is the same or different in 2006 than in 1999;
- any indications as to what a mental health examination in 1989 might reasonably be expected to have determined;
- and the question of Mr. Leavitt's prognosis for the future.

Qualifications

I am a psychiatrist who has been licensed to practice medicine in the State of California since 1974. I maintain a private practice of psychiatry in Menlo Park, California, and am the co-Director of the Center for Psychiatry and the Law at Stanford University. I served as a psychiatric consultant to the Adult Probation Department in Santa Clara County from 1974 through 1978, as a psychiatric consultant to the Superior Court of the State of California in and for the County of Santa Clara since 1978, and as a psychiatric consultant to various other state and federal courts and to various state and federal agencies. Over the course of my career I have evaluated over 5000 criminal defendants either for the courts, the prosecution, or the defense. Of these over 10% were accused of homicide, over 5% were at one time or another capital defendants, and over 20% were accused of homicide or attempted homicide. I have conducted evaluations of condemned individuals on approximately one dozen occasions and have served as the expert for the Office of the Attorney General for the State of California in two other capital proceedings.

Opinions and Conclusions

Personality Disorder Secondary To Frontal Lobe Damage When Hit By a 2x4 At About Age Nine- or Ten-Years-Old

I am of the professional opinion to a reasonable medical certainty that Mr. Richard Leavitt has suffered since his late childhood or early adolescence from the effects of frontal lobe damage that was occasioned by his hitting the front of his head on a 2x4 while sledding. This frontal lobe damage appears from Mr. Leavitt's history to have manifested itself chiefly in those personality changes which are more commonly seen

after frontal lobe damage, especially a heightened level of impulsivity and emotional dyscontrol.

5/11/77 Remarks by Dean Ackley, M.D., regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt's "Explosive Personality"

Psychiatrist Dr. Dean Ackley in his 5/11/77 report makes reference to Mr. Richard Leavitt's "explosive personality."

5/30/84 Remarks by James Gordon, Ph.D., regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt's "Intermittent Explosive Disorder"

Psychologist Dr. James Gordon in his 5/30/84 report commented on Mr. Richard Leavitt as suffering from an Intermittent Explosive Disorder"

12/6/05 Remarks by David H. Groberg, Ph.D., regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt's "Intermittent Explosive Disorder"

Psychologist David H. Groberg, Ph.D., in his 12/6/05 pre-sentence psychological evaluation report diagnosed Mr. Richard Leavitt as suffering from an "Intermittent Explosive Disorder" and mentioned that Mr. Leavitt had previously sustained a head injury. Dr. Groberg neglects any mention of possible brain damage from this head injury and instead comments that, "The cause of this condition [the "intermittent explosive disorder" - JRM] is not clear."

Dr. Groberg then continues that Mr. Leavitt "shows no signs of organic brain dysfunction on any of the tests," despite the known indications even in 1989 that such brain damage can evidence itself in those same "areas of lack of behavioral control, disregard for societal rules and conventions, inability to learn from experience, and inability to form trusting and close human relationships" that he sees as Mr. Leavitt's chief areas of difficulty.

Neither Dr. Groberg nor other examiners have reported any signs of cognitive deficits in Mr. Leavitt as a result of this frontal lobe injury.

At the same time, Dr. David H. Groberg in his 12/6/85 report recommended a neurological examination of Mr. Leavitt, the same neurological evaluation that led first to a more detailed description of the head injury and then to the abnormal CT scan with its evidence of frontal lobe damage.

The results of the subsequent abnormal CT scan suggest that the diagnosis of "Intermittent Explosive Disorder" given Mr. Leavitt by various psychiatric and psychological examiners prior would more appropriately have been "Organic Personality Disorder."

12/14/85 Remarks by Radiologist R. A. Ruiz, M.D., regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt's Abnormal CT Scan following Head Injury with Frontal Lobe Damage

Radiologist Dr. R. A. Ruiz remarked in his 12/13/85 report regarding a CT scan of Mr. Richard Leavitt's brain that it demonstrated an apparent widening of the posterior half or two-thirds of the centrum semiovale in the left cerebral hemisphere together with a slight prominence of the cerebral cortical sulci with the fluid space over a portion of each frontal lobe anteriorly being apparently slightly widened. The CT scan report remarked on how the anterior portion of the interior hemispheric fissure was widened slightly. These findings were noted to be abnormal.

This "slight prominence of the cerebral cortical sulci with the fluid space over a portion of each frontal lobe anteriorly being apparently slightly widened" is of particular significance in that in a substantial number of individuals who are, or were, diagnosed as suffering from an Organic Personality Disorder Secondary to a Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) such radiological or CT findings are not available. As it is, they are not required for the diagnosis of an Organic Personality Disorder; but they do add weight to the opinion that Mr. Richard Leavitt's incidents of impulsivity and aggression after age nine-years-old or ten-years-old were largely secondary to this frontal lobe brain injury.

12/16/85 Remarks by Neurologist Clark E. Jaynes, M.D., regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt's History of Head Trauma

Dr. Clark E. Jaynes in his 12/16/85 neurological evaluation of Mr. Richard Leavitt described how Mr. Leavitt had a history of head trauma wherein he hit the front of his head on a 2x4 while sledding during childhood, as a result of which he was not knocked out, but required sutures even though he was not hospitalized.

Neurologist Clark E. Jaynes, M.D., remarked in his 12/16/85 neurological evaluation of Mr. Richard Leavitt how the 12/13/85 CT scan revealed very slight cortical cerebral atrophy with some apparent widening of the posterior half or two-thirds of the centrum semiovale in the left cerebral hemisphere, suggesting the possibility of demyelinating disease. Dr. Jaynes remarked on how these findings on the CT scan "may or may not have an effect on his cognitive function."

Mr. Richard Leavitt Gives Evidence Of Suffering Since About Age Nine- or Ten-Years-Old From An Organic Personality Disorder (or Personality Disorder Secondary to Brain Injury and Damage)

As it is, Mr. Richard Leavitt gives evidence of having suffered since about ten years of age from an Organic Personality Disorder (OPD) secondary to Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) that was occasioned by his hitting the front of his head with a 2x4 while sledding. Mr. Richard Leavitt subsequently evidenced on a 1985 CT scan abnormalities of brain structure that are consistent with the effects of such a TBI especially in the frontal regions of the brain.

The DSM-III-R diagnosis of Organic Personality Disorder (OPD) was the diagnosis given in the 1980's to individuals who evidenced any of a variety of personality changes following any number of neurological and other general medical conditions that included central nervous system neoplasms (i.e. brain cancers), traumatic brain injury, cerebrovascular disease, Huntington's disease, certain kinds of epilepsy, certain endocrine conditions such as hypothyroidism, hyperthyroidism, hypoadrenocorticism, and hyperadrenocorticism) along with various autoimmune conditions (such as systemic lupus erythematosus).

An Organic Personality Disorder is a mental disorder that is characterized by a short-term-or-long-term personality disturbance that is largely due to underlying brain damage and dysfunction. It is most often characterized by a significant alteration in the expression of one's emotions, needs, and impulses.

Less commonly, cognitive functions may be defective in the areas of planning and thinking.

More commonly, there may be problems with emotional lability, irritability, anger, and sexual disinhibition. More commonly, there is less demonstrable interference in cognitive processes than in emotional and impulse control. This means that one's ability to reason, remember, imagine, and learn may not be that seriously affected, but the individual's judgment may be so poor that he or she evidences significant difficulties in the expression of his or her emotions.

As it is, Organic Personality Disorder is probably the most common neuropsychiatric sequela in individuals who have suffered some sort of frontal brain lesion.

In the case of Mr. Richard Leavitt the cause of his Organic Personality Disorder would be the traumatic brain injury that he appears to have suffered when he hit the front of his head on a 2x4 at about age nine- or ten-years-old.

The DSM-III-R diagnosis of Organic Personality Disorder (OPD) has been known in DSM-IV since 1995 as Personality Changes Secondary to a General Medical Condition. In the case of Mr. Richard Leavitt that General Medical Condition would be the damage to the structure and function of his brain as a result of the traumatic brain injury he sustained at age nine- or ten-years-old.

The evidence of Mr. Richard Leavitt having sustained such a Traumatic Brain Injury is contained in the reports of the several medical and psychiatric examinations to which he was subjected in the years prior to 1989. Indeed, the 12/13/85 detailed descriptions of the abnormalities of the Mr. Richard Leavitt's brain structure (and presumably brain function) are contained in the 12/13/85 report of the abnormalities discovered in a CT scan of his brain and referenced in the 12/16/85 report of Clark Jaynes, M.D. DSM-IV further classifies Organic Personality Disorders (or Personality Changes due to General Medical Condition) on the basis of the predominant symptom presentation into what for Mr. Leavitt would be the combined (i.e. labile, disinhibited, and/or aggressive)

type. The likelihood is that his clinical presentation of this underlying damage to the structure and function of his brain depends on the nature and localization of the pathological processes associated with this damage. As it is, diseases and/or damage that preferentially affect the frontal lobes or sub-cortical structures are more likely to manifest themselves with prominent personality changes, as is the situation with Mr. Leavitt. All of this was known in 1989.

More is known presently about these conditions since 1989. Thus, in 2001, Duffy and Campbell identified three distinct prefrontal syndromes, the dys-executive type, the disinhibited type, and the apathetic type. The dys-executive type involves the dorsal convexity system and manifests itself in diminished judgment, planning, insight, temporal organization, cognitive impersistence, motor programming deficits, and diminished self care. The disinhibited type involves the orbito-frontal system and presents with stimulus driven behavior, diminished social insight, increased distractibility, a heightened level of emotional lability. It is known in clinical practice, however, that the lesions from brain injury are seldom confined to any of these systems so that a given brain-damaged individual is likely to manifest more than one of these symptom clusters.

DSM-III-R Organic Personality Disorders (or DSM-IV Personality Changes due to a Generalized Medical Condition) have been known to be addressable, remediable, and treatable for over thirty years. Ordinarily treatment approaches have included psychostimulants for attentional deficits together with antipsychotics, benzodiazepines, and lithium for disinhibited behavior. All of these were available in the late 1980's.

History of Emotional Explosiveness

Rule Out Intermittent Explosive Disorder

Clark E. Jaynes, M.D., of Idaho Falls, Idaho, in his 12/16/85 neurological evaluation of Mr. Richard Leavitt notes how Mr. Leavitt agrees that he does have an explosive personality.

The need to rule out an Intermittent Explosive Disorder is that the DSM-III-R description of that condition in 1989 is descriptively based on the exhibition of "several discrete episodes of loss of control of aggressive impulses that result in serious assault or destruction of property." Inasmuch as Mr. Leavitt does appear to have exhibited such "several discrete episodes of loss of control of aggressive impulses," this diagnosis might theoretically have applied to him if the focus is only on a description of behavior. At the same time, the 1989 diagnosis of intermittent Explosive Disorder, like other Disorders of Impulse Control that are Not Elsewhere Classified, generally excludes disorders that are organic in origin. In such cases (as in the case of Mr. Richard Leavitt), the appropriate diagnosis in 1989 would have been an Organic Personality Disorder. (The current DSM-IV diagnosis would be a Personality Change Secondary to Traumatic Brain Injury [TBI]).

The existence of a previous head injury that was consistent with a Traumatic Brain Injury preceding any of Mr. Leavitt's documented or reported history of violence and/or aggression was known in 1989. Thus, Dr. Jaynes remarks in his 12/16/85 report how Mr. Richard Leavitt indicated that he had a history of head trauma when hit by a 2x4 during childhood, as a result of which he was not knocked out, but required sutures even though he was not hospitalized. The performance of the requested mental health examination at the time of the 1989 re-sentencing of Mr. Richard Leavitt would thus likely have addressed this issue of Mr. Richard Leavitt giving evidence of suffering from an Organic Personality Disorder rather than an Intermittent Explosive Disorder.

History of Premature Birth

Dr. Clark E. Jaynes in his 12/16/85 neurological evaluation of Mr. Richard Leavitt noted how Mr. Leavitt had been born one month early by dates with Mr. Leavitt indicating that his mother had told him that he had been in an "incubator" for one-to-two weeks. Whatever difficulties or neurological immaturity that may have resulted from his immaturity at birth, Mr. Richard Leavitt appears to have made all of his motor milestones at a normal and expected pace. Mr. Richard Leavitt is noted to have denied any problems with dexteritous movements of motor skills. In addition, Mr. Leavitt was noted to deny any problems with his memory, with periods of amnesia, with blackout attacks, or with any type of seizure activity. He was noted also to deny any problems with meningitis, encephalitis, any serious brain infections, or his ever having been in a coma. At the same time, the combination of prematurity and childhood brain damage raises significant questions as to how much Mr. Richard Leavitt's known prematurity at birth predisposed him at age nine- or ten-year-old to experiencing in a more catastrophic fashion the brain injuries from the blow from 2x4 than might otherwise have been the case.

Description of Childhood Behavior Consistent with Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder

There are suggestions from the reports of Mr. Leavitt's mother that he exhibited, as a child, behavior that would be consistent with the presence of an Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder. If her observations are accurate and the implications of ADHD are correct, this suggests that Mr. Leavitt may have suffered even prior to the frontal lobe injury from those more subtle kinds of brain abnormalities which underlie ADHD. If so, this pre-existing vulnerability of Mr. Leavitt's brain may partially account for a particular susceptibility on his part to the development of a later Organic Personality Disorder following a traumatic brain injury.

Complaints of Headaches before 1985

Dr. Clark E. Jaynes in his 12/16/85 report regarding Mr. Richard Leavitt notes how Mr. Leavitt had complained about "a fair amount of headaches in the past, especially prior to

his trial, and with the headaches having abated since the trial. This would suggest that the headaches were stress-induced. What cannot be determined is whether Mr. Leavitt's vulnerability to the experience of the headaches was intensified as a result of either his premature birth or (more importantly) his later head injury. While the presence of such headaches is not dispositive, it is certainly consistent with underlying brain damage.

Attentional Problems in High School

Dr. Clark E. Jaynes notes in his 12/16/05 report to the Honorable Reynold George that Mr. Richard Leavitt reported having made only C's, D's, and F's in high school. While academic problems can result from many sources (attentional, emotional, maturational, and substances-based), Mr. Richard Leavitt's known traumatic brain injury prior to 1985 can likewise be seen as accounting for at least some of these academic problems over the years immediately following his brain injury.

Intermittent Explosive Disorder Diagnosis Trumped by Organic Personality Disorder


Intermittent Explosive Disorder is a disorder of an impulse control that is not classified as part of a Substance-related Disorder, a Paraphilia or Sexual Disorder, an Anti-Social Personality Disorder, a Conduct Disorder, Schizophrenia, or a Mood Disorder, all of which may have certain features that involve problems of impulse control. The essential feature of an Impulse-Control Disorder is the failure (not an inability or an organically impaired ability) to resist an impulse, a drive, or a temptation to perform an act that is harmful either to the person performing the act or to other people. To the extent that Mr. Richard Leavitt gives documented evidence of a head injury and subsequent brain damage, to that extent his condition would be called and diagnosed an Organic Personality Disorder and not an Intermittent Explosive Disorder.

Antisocial Personality Disorder Trumped by Organic Personality Disorder

Similar to the situation with the Intermittent Explosive Disorder, the diagnosis of Antisocial Personality Disorder is ordinarily not given to an individual whose ostensibly repeated antisocial conduct is judged to be the result of brain damage. In that case, the appropriate diagnosis, as in the case of Mr. Richard Leavitt, would be an Organic Personality Disorder (under DSM-III-R in 1989) or Personality Changes due to the Generalized Medical Condition of a Traumatic Brain Injury at age nine- or ten-years-old (under DSM-IV since 1995).
