
PROGNOSIS: Extremely poor.

Progress: Patient has just begun his job washing cars; no DVR contact as yet. Goal not achieved.

Treatment: Continue referral to Bud Cornia, Industrial Therapist, for industrial assignment; Continue referral to Bill Cpb, B.S., DVR Counselor, for evaluation and planning.

PHYSICIANS NOTES

12-1-80 - ADMISSION NOTE:

This nineteen year old, single, white male truck driver is being admitted on Voluntary Application from Rock Springs, Sweetwater County, Wyoming. Arrived at Wyoming State Hospital by bus as direct transfer from Sweetwater County Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient since 11-28-80 under care of Dr. Stoltzner. Preadmission contact by Joe Dilla, Wyoming State Hospital Liaison Social Worker at Southwestern Wyoming Mental Health Center, who stated, "Depression and suicide attempt 11-28-80. Three-year history of alcohol abuse without prior treatment. Please consider for Alcohol and Drug Treatment Program,"

Patient states he has been drinking daily since March, 1980, and lately consuming "three six-packs and pint whiskey daily." Began drinking before he entered U.S. Army January, 1978. On Friday 11-28-80 at 4 p.m. he took overdose of "Sleepeze" ("one half bottle") while drunk. A neighbor discovered him an hour later and took him to hospital emergency room where vomiting was induced and he was admitted. States he was depressed because he had been reading some rejecting letters from his mother who lives in Arizona.

Patient admits frequent blackouts, rare a.m. shakes and a.m. drinks. No delirium tremens or seizures. Last drink 11-25-80.

Previous Psychiatric Treatment: Hospitalized for four days at U.S. Army Hospital at Ft. McClellan, Alabama, January, 1980, for "slight nervous breakdown and suicidal thoughts."

Past Medical History: Usual childhood diseases. T&A. Open reduction fracture left thumb age fourteen. No fractures or serious injuries. Bronchial asthma since age twelve and takes Marax tablets p.r.n. Last asthmatic attack about 11-24-80.

Allergies: None known.

Military History: U.S. Army January, 1978, to March, 1980 - honorable transfer to reserve unit - inactive.

Educational History: 12th grade.

Chemical History: Denies drugs except alcohol.

Provisional Diagnosis: Alcoholism.
