Type 1 Diabetes	 Diabetes is associated with an increased risk for a number of serious, sometimes life-threatening complications and certain populations experience an even greater threat. Good diabetes control can help reduce your risk, however many people are not even aware that they have diabetes until they develop one of its complications. Heart disease and stroke Heart disease and stroke account for about 65% of deaths in people with diabetes. Adults with diabetes have heart disease death rates about 2 to 4 times higher than adults without diabetes. The risk for stroke is 2 to 4 times higher and the risk of death from stroke is 2.8 times higher among people with diabetes. Deaths from heart disease have decreased significantly among men with diabetes in recent years, but that trend has not been true in women. From 1971 to 2000, the rate of death from heart disease among men with diabetes decreased from 16.8 deaths pet 1000 men to 8.1 deaths per 1000. Among women with diabetes however deals from heart disease did not decline from 1971 to 2000, and the difference in death rate from all causes between diabetic and onholabetic women more than doubled, from a difference of 8.3 to 32.2 annual deaths per 1000 women (Gregg et al., Annals of Internal Medicine, 2007). 						your risk for heart attack and stroke

Shop for Books & Gifts	 of new cases in 2005. In 2005, 46,739 people with diabetes began treatment for end-stage renal disease (ESRD). In 2002, a total of 178,689 people with ESRD due to diabetes were living on chronic dialysis or with a kidney transplant. 						

In people with type 1 diabetes, therapy that keeps blood sugar levels as close to normal as possible reduces damage to the kidneys by 35% to 56% (New England Journal of Medicine, September 30, 1993). Experts believe that these results can also be applied to those with type 2 diabetes.

Nervous system disease

- About 60% to 70% of people with diabetes have mild to severe forms of nervous system damage. The results of such damage include impaired sensation or pain in the feet or hands, slowed digestion of food in the stomach, carpal tunnel syndrome, and other nerve problems.
- Almost 30% of people with diabetes aged 40 years or older have impaired sensation in the feet (i.e., at least one area that lacks feeling).
- · Severe forms of diabetic nerve disease are a major contributing cause of lower-extremity amputations.

Amputations

- More than 60% of nontraumatic lower-limb amputations occur in people with diabetes.
- In 2004, about 71,000 nontraumatic lower-limb amputations were performed in people with diabetes.
- The rate of amputation for people with diabetes is 10 times higher than for people without diabetes.

Dental disease

- Periodontal (gum) disease is more common in people with diabetes. Among young adults, those with diabetes bave about twice the risk of those without diabetes.
 Almost one mird of prople with diabetes have severe periodontal
- Roisease with oss of attachment of the gums to the teeth measuring 5 millimeters or more.

 Persons with poorly controlled diabetes (A1c > 9%) were nearly 3 times more likely to have severe periodontitis than those without diabetes.

Complications of pregnancy

- Poorly controlled diabetes before conception and during the first trimester of pregnancy can cause major birth defects in 5% to 10% of pregnancies and spontaneous abortions in 15% to 20% of pregnancies.
- · Poorly controlled diabetes during the second and third trimesters of pregnancy can result in excessively large babies, posing a risk to both mother and child.

Sexual Dysfunction

 Diabetes significantly increases the risk for sexual dysfunction in both men and women.

Other complications

- Uncontrolled diabetes often leads to biochemical imbalances that can cause acute life-threatening events, such as diabetic ketoacidosis and hyperosmolar (nonketotic) coma
- People with diabetes are more susceptible to many other illnesses and, once they acquire these illnesses, often have worse prognoses.
